

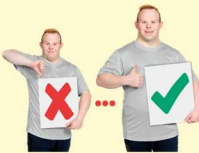


Project CECiLiA is all about finding out about Care (Education) and Treatment Reviews.

Project CECiLiA has four steps

Step 1



Step 1. CECiLiA Survey

We want to hear from:

- Children and adults with learning disabilities
- Autistic children and adults
- Family members and carers
- C(E)TR panel members
- Health, education, social care professionals

People can do the survey:

- Online
- On paper



We can support people to do the survey if they want



People who find it hard to communicate can also do a face-to-face Talking Mats interview.



326 people did our survey by the end of January

Step 2



Step 2. is about:

- watching what happens at C(E)TRs and
- listening to what people say



We will interview:

- People with learning disabilities and autistic people
- Family members and carers
- Professionals

Step 3



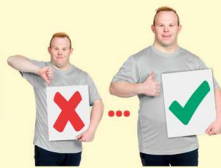
Step 3. is about looking at information about autistic people and people with a learning disability who are in hospital

- they leave hospital

Step 4
