

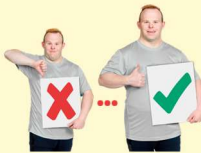


Project CECiLiA is all about finding out about Care (Education) and Treatment Reviews.

They are also called C(E)TRs.



We want to know what people think about C(E)TRs.



- What is good?
- What is not so good?
- What could be better?



We told you about our survey in Newsletter 1.



People can take a 30 minute survey to tell us what they think about C(E)TRs



We can give a £20 shopping voucher to people who take our survey



So far, 432 people have done our survey



People can do the survey:

- Online
- On paper



People can also do a Talking Mats interview if they find reading and talking difficult



- We are working with NHS Trusts and other organisations
- They have been telling people about our survey

We meet with people from Trusts and organisations

We talk about:

- how to tell people about the survey
- how to help people with the survey

We are also going to C(E)TRs and interviewing people.

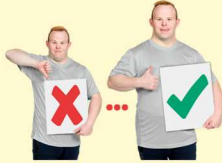


Trusts and organisations can tell us they want to take part by emailing:
